LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT



Dear Friends,

First of all I would like to express my gratitude for the trust and honor bestowed on me to serve EFAS as President the coming two years. After assisting the previous presidents Heino Küster and Ian Winson as Secretary and my predecessor Hakon Kofoed as president-elect it is an enormous challenge to continue their hard and excellent work for this fantastic Society.

Geneva and new constitution

The past EFAS congress in Geneva has become a historic one for our Society. The scientific Symposia proved to be of interest for both the residents as for the more experienced foot and ankle surgeon and the content of the Free Papers was again of a higher level than at previous meetings. The workshops (including cadaver!) were well attended. EFAS thanks the Scientific Committee chaired by Thanos Badekas for its continued good work. We enjoyed a marvelous Faculty dinner with excellent Swiss wines and the Welcome Reception and Congress Dinner, both located at the lakeside with beautiful views in romantic buildings were unforgettable. This would all not have been possible without the enormous support of the Local Host, Marino Delmi.

What really made this meeting historical were the unanimously voted changes to the Constitution of EFAS during our Annual General Assembly. EFAS originated from the merging of the European Federation of Foot and Ankle Societies (EFFAS) and the European Society of Foot and Ankle Surgeons (ESFAS). A voting system was developed that more or less guaranteed the influence of members coming from both these groups in the Council of Management of the new society. This has been the source of much debate over the years. Members of National Societies expressed that the influence of only 100 Individual Members within a Society of thousands of members was very undemocratic and the Individual Members emphasized that peo-

ple should fulfill certain positions within the organization on basis of their personal merits and not on basis of their nationality or political position within their National Society. Thanks to the groundbreaking efforts of the Membership Committee chaired by Patrick Laing, EFAS now has a true European democratic "one-man-one-vote" system. As the number of people from one country is limited to 2, the Council of Management will now consist of a mix of representatives from all European countries and the election of council members will be on the basis of merit. The present list of members of the Council of Management effectively demonstrates this principle and I am very much looking forward to working with this enthusiastic group of colleagues.

FAS, Committees and activities 2011

The past years have witnessed important achievements concerning both the organization of our Society and our journal Foot and Ankle Surgery. To start with the last, as you all know, Foot and Ankle Surgery has become Pubmed listed. EFAS is indebted to the editors Michael Stephens, Tom Smith and Sandro Giannini for this accomplishment. This has important implications resulting, already, in improvement of the scientific quality of the publications and increase of submissions. EFAS needs your help in developing content. Science, EBM, exchange of knowledge and clinical expertise are the foundations on which we build in order to improve the quality of care of our patients. As organization EFAS has made huge steps forward, although it is clear that we are still behind compared to some fellow societies. The first and most important step was to contract the team of Event-Plus as Secretariat for EFAS. Having been involved in the organization of meetings and courses from the very first beginning of EFAS, I have had the opportunity to witness the improvement in how these are organized. The Secretariat plays a crucial role towards our industrial

sponsors and by now they have build up an enormous expertise. Experiencing the results of a volcanic ash cloud at the time of an Instructional Course is, however, an event that our Society does not want to experience again. We are resolutely building up a strong structure with committees that actually take care of the goals of our Society. A new Research & Education Committee has been formed with Victor Valderrabano in the chair. This committee is composed of both clinicians and biomechanical scientists and is set to play an important role in the future of EFAS.

Another newcomer is the Certification Committee chaired by Don Mc Bride. It will be their difficult quest to define European standards and to make a first step towards European certification of Foot and Ankle Surgery. Although we will cooperate with the UEMS (European Accreditation Council for Continuing Medical Education) we have decided to proceed on our own initiative. There are huge and multiple, practical and financial hurdles to be taken, but ultimately EFAS hopes to compile a series of certified Training Centres for Foot and Ankle Surgery throughout Europe.

EFAS continues its Instructional Course with Yves Tourné at the helm of the Educational Committee. After the ash cloud misfortune in April the Dublin Instructional Course was held in June. In spite of the necessity to re-schedule the course there were 50 new participants and based on the evaluation forms and comments the course was much appreciated. Next year the IC will be held in Vilnius, Lithuania, 15-16 April 2011 and we hope to welcome many colleagues from the Baltic countries, Poland and Russia. After Paris (2007) and Brussels (2009) the Advanced Symposium, steered by the Scientific Committee, is proving to be an enormous success and everybody is looking forward to the next one which will take place in Munich 9th -10th December 2011. Do not miss this!!!

In Copenhagen we will certainly invite all presidents of the National Foot and Ankle Societies/Associations for a meeting followed by a Presidential Dinner as instituted by my predecessor Hakon Kofoed in Vienna. Only through strong collaboration will we be able to achieve goals on a European wide scale, for instance the above mentioned certification system. Neither would the change of the EFAS voting

system be achieved without the support of all National Societies.

And what are the plans?

At the coming Council of Management meeting in Amsterdam it will be the task of Council to further develop the EFAS strategy. Issues to be dealt with concern all the above mentioned matters, but also our position between other parties dealing with Foot and Ankle Surgery, our collaboration with the industrial sponsors, improving our scientific and educational efforts, better scheduling of our events, and many more. Every president, however, seems to add specific personal goals. One of these goals will certainly be the communication with you, with the members. EFAS counts more than 3000 members. However, I am afraid that the vast majority is only mildly interested in what goes on in EFAS. How can we get more colleagues involved and interested? To start with, you need to read and hear more about EFAS. EFAS is a few steps behind regarding e-communication and e-learning. The difficulties to read and download publications from our own journal FAS are illustrative. These should be easily accessible for all members! EFAS

should provide more service to it's members and better educational/ informative facilities should be offered through our website.

EDITORIAL

It certainly doesn't seem that long since the EFAS membership were basking on the balmy beaches of southern Portugal at the Vilamoura congress and now we have all enjoyed the elegance and sophistication of the beautiful city of Geneva. The Presidents have changed, the "Welsh Dwarf" gave way to the "Fuming Viking", who has now handed the reins of power to the "Flying Dutchman". We will all wish to thank Hakon Kofoed for his hard work and

wish good fortune to Jan Willem Louwers for the next few years.

In the last 2 years, there has certainly been no lack of events and activity. Our journal is more popular than ever, thanks, I am sure, to the listing on Pubmed. The editorial staff have not been immune to change. New blood has been brought into the editorial board, to provide new energy and enthusiasm. One has to wonder whether this will become a rolling

programme of appointments, to provide a regular freshness of approach, whilst maintaining the wisdom of experience. We can all look forward to interesting review articles, stimulating new research and possibly the occasional salutary lesson from a case report. Our congress was undoubtedly scientifically stimulating. The presentations ranged from basic science, through to complex, expensive technology, to the good and bad outcomes, associated with our day-to-day work. It was educational for all

foot and ankle surgeons and I would encourage as many of you to attend congress as possible, as I am sure that you will find it a thoroughly enjoyable, as well as an educational event. I am sure that we will all wish to thank Marino Delmi, our local host, and, of course, our EFAS Secretariat, for facilitating such an excellent meeting. Now we must look forward to the instructional course in April, to be held in Vilnius in Lithuania and the EFAS Specialty Day in Copenhagen in Denmark and then the Master class symposium in December

2010, in Munich, Germany. As such a large organisation, we have much to gain from each others' experience and research. The years that have gone have been highly successful for EFAS and there is no reason why the future can not be even more so. I hope that we all continue to benefit from the Society and enjoy ourselves whilst we do it.

8TH EFAS CONGRESS, CMU, GENEVA, 2ND-4TH SEPTEMBER 2010

New minimal invasive surgical techniques presented by various surgeons randomised prospective studies promised. Presidential lecture attracts longstanding applause. New more democratic constitution of EFAS receives virtual unanimous approval Council elections held under new voting system.

This year's EFAS congress, held in Geneva, was perfectly prepared by Marino Delmi, the local host with his team, ably supported by our hard working Secretariat. The meeting started punctually on Thursday morning after a brief opening ceremony by the out-going president Hakon Kofoed. The commercial exhibition was well prepared with Coffee tables being arranged at various sites and delegates had the chance to see and feel some of the instruments being presented at the sessions. Delegates felt that the opportunity presented by workshops and the live surgery was not only relevant to their medical practice but also very instructional as they offered the touch of a "hands on" experience. On Thursday night the Council of Geneva supported the EFAS Welcome Reception on the south side of lake Geneva at the Hotel du Parc des Eaux-Vives with a splendid view across the lake to the historic city centre.

Friday saw a packed program including a session on minimally invasive surgery. A number of new operative techniques were presented by different surgeons and assurances were given to provide results of randomized prospective studies in the future. The EFAS General Assembly was held in the late morning. Patrick Laing explained to the delegates the proposed changes to the EFAS Constitution. The new voting system is now based on the one person, one vote principle with the caveat that no country should have more than two members on the council and the four largest country contributors would have at least one member on the council. The place of business would be Europe and the historic links to Scottish Law would be deleted. The voting system received a virtual unanimous approval and the subsequent Council election was held under the new constitution. The Polish Foot and Ankle Society was welcomed as a new full member of EFAS as of 2011. The late afternoon saw the Presidential Lecture by Professor Leslie Klenemann (one of the founding members of EFAS) who presented a very interesting talk on Human and Ape locomotion and the difficulties of attempting to get appropriate ape locomotion data. The lecture received a long, warm round

of applause. After the lecture it was time for the President Hakon Kofoed to step down and the new president, Jan-Willem Louwerens, to take the helm. In his first speech as President, Jan-Willem Louwerens addressed the assembly as "friends" and he paid tribute to the achievements of his predecessors. The congress formal Gala Dinner was held at the "Four Seasons Hotel des Bergues" at the historic centre on the north side of the lake close to the Rhone river. The balcony offered a spectacular view over the lake with a lovely view of the sunset. Saturday provided further interesting sessions with the congress finishing on schedule.

Discussing the meeting with non-european delegates showed that they enjoyed the structure of the meeting and were very pleased with the organisation. One delegate Dr L. Carls Ribero Lara from the Sao Paulo area in Brazil particularly pointed out that traditionally Brazilian surgeons would go to North America but he thoroughly enjoyed the meeting because of the diversity in clinical approaches by surgeons of different traditions.

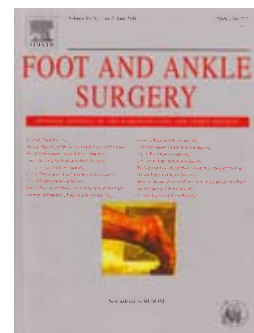

NEW COUNCIL MEMBER - PROFILE



Tahir Ögüt, MD, Istanbul University Cerrahpasa Medical Faculty Department of Orthopaedics and Traumatology, Kocamustafapasa, Istanbul, Turkey

I was born in Ankara, in 1967. I attended medical school in Ankara, graduating in 1991. I completed my residency training in Istanbul University, Cerrahpasa Medical School between 1992-1997. I served in the military as an orthopaedic surgeon for 18 months and then in private practice for 8 months. I returned to academic practice after the big Marmara earthquake in 1999, and worked as an attending orthopaedic surgeon at Cerrahpasa Medical School between 1999-2005. I was responsible for the education of 20 residents and performed all kinds of orthopaedic surgery 5 days a week.

In 2001, I worked with Dr. M. Catagni in Lecco, Italy where I had the chance to learn Ilizarov surgery. My interest in foot surgery deepened after attending the 4th International Foot and Ankle Course in Bad Homburg, Germany. In 2003, first I visited Dr C.N. van Dijk in Amsterdam AMC Hospital where I learned ankle and hindfoot arthroscopy. Soon after, I visited Dr J W Louwerens in Nijmegen for 3 weeks and received my first training about foot surgery from him.

I have to say that 7 years after that visit, it is really significant and pleasing for me to be elected for the EFAS council under the presidency of Dr Louwerens. In April 2005, I passed the oral and written examinations and qualified to be an Associate Professor in Orthopaedics and Traumatology. From September 2006 to February 2007, for 6 months, I worked with Dr J. Nunley and Dr Mark Easley at Duke University in North Carolina, USA. It was quite an experience in foot surgery.

In December 2004, we founded Turkish Society of Foot and Ankle Surgery with four other colleagues. I worked as the general secretary of the society for 4 years under presidency of Prof. Tanil Esemeli. In 2008, I became the president of the Turkish Foot and Ankle Society of which I continued until June of this year when Dr Onder Kilicoglu took over. I am continuing as one of the board members of the society.

The Turkish Foot and Ankle Society is established as a branch of Turkish Society of Orthopedics and Traumatology. The society has organized 5 international courses and different seminars in congresses each year. Our society has reached to a size of 100 members and 40 of them are co-members of EFAS today. Dr Ian Winson, Dr JW Louwerens, Dr Steve Parsons and Dr Per Henrik Agren were the Instructors of our 4th course, last year. We spent very good time with them in Istanbul and we learned a lot.

I am currently working as an Associate Professor of Orthopaedics at Istanbul University, Cerrahpasa Medical Faculty. Foot and ankle surgery has consisted 85% of my practice for the last 4 years. The remaining 15% consists of lower extremity and Ilizarov surgery. I speak English and German fluently. I am married and have a 16 month old daughter named Zeynep.

EFAS SPECIALTY DAY AT EFORT CONGRESS, 3RD JUNE 2011, COPENHAGEN

EFAS COUNCIL BIDS FOND FAREWELL TO LONG-SERVING MEMBER IAN WINSON

Well 10 years have now flashed by officially, Stockholm to Geneva via a wide range of stops around Europe. I have the pleasure of working with a highly professional secretariat who have grown in their experience and their ability to help fulfil the ambitions of the Society they represent.

I have made a wide variety of friends all over Europe who have had the characteristics of all foot and ankle surgeons. These are people who are thoughtful clinicians, who do not hesitate to challenge other's and more importantly their own thinking. They enjoy what they do because there are so many challenges. I saw scientists and applied scientists working together. Have I learnt a lot? For sure, but mainly not to admit when some one tells me something completely new. One of the world's greatest poker players (a woman) was once asked did everyone have "a tell". This is the give away sign indicating that they had a very good hand or that they were bluffing. She confirmed they did. The interviewer asked how people could not see her 'tells' because she was such an open and talkative person. Her reply was "how can they tell my 'tell' when I am telling them so much more". A good model for a devious past president, so am grateful to those who have continued my education without even realizing it!

I am amazed at what has been achieved over these ten years. It is incredible that so much hard work is done by so many people on a voluntary basis. We now have an extensive committee structure, which allows proper representation in matters of education, science, research, fellowship support, membership and accreditation. We run foot and ankle courses, congresses, advanced symposia and have the opportunity to contribute to EFORT meetings on a formal basis. Thanks to the hard work of Patrick Laing and his membership committee we now have a more balanced way of electing the council. We have a fiscal balance to our accounts which renders security for the future.

What to say of the meeting in Geneva? Clearly the Swiss have influence in high places as we arrived to perfect weather from what had been a miserable August. The social occasions were excellent with Geneva at it's most resplendent. The meeting itself presented a wide range symposia and free papers. I must admit personally I don't think the "live operating on cadavers??" worked that well, but junior colleagues attending the meeting thought it was good for them. They seemed to appreciate that senior colleagues sidling off for an early lunch was actually part of the plan. I was particularly interested in the entertaining contrast in symposia on Basic Science and MIS. Though MIS has to be looked at and will have a role, in the era of evidence based medicine there is no justification for not pursuing randomized controlled trials. There are such obvious questions and now all of funding agencies are playing the same game; if you don't level two evidence, we aren't going to pay for it. Equally the basic science section raised issues of how you establish reliable models that transfer effectively into the clinical situation, always a difficult task to achieve.

Bottom line, Geneva was fun and seeing Marino Delmi with a big smile on his face for hard work successfully achieved. The new council elect seems like a good mix. From the British point of view, those of us stepping down from council were pleased to realize that with the new voting system the British record of 4 members of council will not now be broken! It shouldn't happen and won't now.

So what does the future hold? Our in-coming President Jan-Willem Louwerens seem to suggest that my next task was a trip to Mordor, accompanied by a Viking(?), a German lord (from the land of men), a French wizard, an Irish Elf and a Belgian horsewoman(????), but what are our tasks? The journal is growing in its role and influence. We need to secure its editorial future and EFAS' input into it. We need to see where it will be twenty years time not in two years. We need to continue to have a strong presence in EFORT. If we are only presented with and represented by generalists we will not push our subject forward. The era of men is coming and in European foot and ankle terms that really could hit hard by imposed accreditation, both of individuals and institutions. The Orcs (politicians with "an interest in health care") will want to pile the bodies high and cheap. They will continue to try to ignore that the most efficient health service is one that provides high quality care and try to dumb things down.

On that happy note I would like to thank everyone for their company over the last 10 years. I have had tremendous fun. I will continue to turn up if only to irritate people!

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NINE MILESTONES

Report of outgoing EFAS President Hakon Kofoed

When I became EFAS President October 2008 a 9 point plan for the future work of EFAS was established.

- 1) The journal "Foot Ankle Surgery" should be indexed.
- 2) The Educational and Scientific committees should be optimised.
- 3) The members committee should work on a new voting system "one-man-one vote".
- 4) Certification of European Foot Ankle Surgeons
- 5) Solving conflicts with other societies, especially EFORT
- 6) Better reimbursement for the officers costs a meetings
- 7) Better payment for the secretariat
- 8) A closer connection with the Industry with evaluation of their new products
- 9) A more active role of the members for the structure of Foot Ankle surgery throughout Europe.

It is my pleasure to announce that eight of these nine milestones have been reached.

- 1) has been successfully accomplished.
- 2) These committees have become more effective.
- 3) was voted through at the last GA. The following ballot gave a more even distribution and spread of officers from the European countries.
- 4) A committee has been formed with Don Mc Bride as chairman to outline the structure. The first task is to unify the European Foot Ankle Societies in what skill that are needed and how the individual countries can accomplish that. Knowledge of what is the least skills a Foot and Ankle surgeon should possess, how many centres in each country are needed for this education, and how many surgeons should be educated per year should be established. When this has been accomplished the entire program will be presented to UEMS for approval.
- 5) Our relationship with EFORT has become very successful and mutual agreements have been reached with the other big specialist societies and EFORT about courses and congresses, as well as better imbursement for the specialist societies involvement. Sofar EFAS will have one speciality day in the EFORT congress in the year that we do not have our own congress. In the years with our own congress we will contribute to EFORT with a two hours symposium.
- 6) The economy is still good in spite of the financial crises, and an economical draw back for a cancelled course due to the Islandic eruption. The course was held later on, and the financial damage was limited.
- 7) The secretariat did not get a direct increase in wages, but will get a certain amount of the surplus from courses and congresses.
- 8) Some scientific projects with new devises from the Industry has been instituted.
- 9) In order to be more close to the members and to get a common European line for foot and ankle surgery, a yearly meeting with the National presidents of European Foot and Ankle societies has been instituted, and two meetings have already been held.

During the last two years certain other issues arose. One major objective will be the establishment of a European database for ankle arthroplasties. Several European countries already have national registers. There is an uneven distribution of the devises used in different countries, and it is therefore not possible to compare these devises unless the results are brought into a common database. There are certain legal aspects to this, and they differ from one country to another. A committee has been formed to solve these problems (Kofoed, Winson and Goldberg and probably others co-opted).

To be the president of EFAS for two years has been my pleasure, the achievements of the goals have been encouraging, and the officers and the committees have all be working, maybe not harder, but smarter. The future for EFAS is bright, and it with pride that I now pass the torch on to Jan Willem Louwerens as our new president.
